Mee#ng starts 19:35 hrs IRT / 20:00 hrs GMT

1. Presenta*on

The mee#ng opens with a presenta#on by John D. Flanagan, Chairman of I.R.B and Crossmolina Community Council - a brief history of express trusts, feigned authority and founda#on of the I.R.B. and its role in current events. The presenta#on shows "how they do what they do to us" and offers solu#ons through the mandate held but the Organisa#on.

2. Ques*ons/Discussion from/amongst the a8endees

It is asked about the Faodhla, to which the Chair explains in Irish folklore they were the Protectors of the Communi#es and Children, which is in essence what the Community Councils will be. It is explained how the Council, once it has 100 Co-Op Members, will be ra#fied as the Council for the Co-Op.

The Community must have the ul#mate say in what happens in their community. The Council will become empowered by Collec#ve Knowledge. The fundamental standing of the Council & Co-Op reverts back to the ancient unwriWen law of:

- 100 Your own Council
- 300 Your own Courts
- 600 Your own Count(r)y

Colm M. Granahan asks the Chair about the IPAS centres and what can be done. The Chair explains that Cri#cal Mass of at least 100 Co-Op members need to be established. Every situa#on is a case-by-case basis. Private property is a right, and difficult for a Community Council to interfere with. However, this doesn't render roads & services within the Community beyond the reach of the Community Council making the highest Claim to on behalf of the Community Co-Op. The solu#on is to gain Collec#ve Knowledge, Knowing how



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they do what they do to you, rising above what's being done. The Council can in future introduce by-laws with a trial by jury Court.

It is asked and confirmed that there are currently 30 Co-Op Members. A ques#on is asked is it possible to reduce the pre-requisite number for ra#fica#on of the Co-Op, which the Council can't do as that would undermine our standing under the aforemen#oned unwriWen law. John G. BarreW asked if people sign up for the co-op would/could it affect their rights and en#tlements from the corporate State. The Chair confirms that becoming a Member of a Co-Op does not and can not affect an individual's rights and en#tlements to any benefits they may be availing of from the corporate State.

The Chair outlines how a properly constructed Council & Co-Op, with sufficient knowledge in knowing how to say no, can move above the imposi#on of an IPAS centre with the introduc#on of by-laws affec#ng outside of the private property. The chair references ac#ons taken prior to the establishment of the Finglas Community Council re Thornton Hall which appear to have diverted the plans of the local corporate council, for now anyway.

The ques#on is raised can the process be stopped at the Planning stage, to which the Chairs responds yes, by challenging the Planning Act. Again, it is reiterated and reaffirmed by the Chair: "Know how they do what they do to you".

The Chair reminds the aWendees they have nothing to lose and everything to gain by becoming members of the Co-Op for 5 euro (to cover opera#onal expenses etc.). It's for ordinary Co-Op Members to have a say in what goes on in their Community. The responsibility is on the Council to consistently their knowledge and bring themselves up to speed as to "how they do what they do you". The Chair advises that the Co-Op Members have a WhatsApp group chat for Communica#on with the Council and for the provision of a vo#ng mechanism when that #me arrives. Howard M. Hughes concludes the Mee#ng by reading aloud the Manifesto of the Crossmolina Community Co-Op and Council.
